Craig's talk will give his purely personal 'take' on what is undoubtedly a local wonder and well worth a visit, especially if you can manage that slightly awkward descent and confront the extraordinary rock formations head on and close-up, as Hutton did, in 1788, when he and his two companions got off their boat at Siccar Point. Craig will also explain the Unconformity's main contours and its significance in lay-terms and to convey Hutton's claim (made by others) to be the Father of Modern Geology, which is undoubtedly strong. Photographs that Craig and his daughter took on a recent descent to Siccar Point will provide a dramatic backdrop to this illustrated talk.

John Muir and William Keith: Kindred Souls – a Friends' Exhibition

My wife Val and I were visiting our son and his family in Aberdeenshire recently, writes Will Collin, and I couldn't resist persuading her to accompany me on a visit to Oldmeldrum, a wee town with a large history 18 miles or so north of Aberdeen and six miles northeast of Inverurie. The reason for my visit was a meeting with David Catto, Aberdeenshire Local Studies Librarian, and his colleague Lorraine. Both had visited the Birthplace back in 2015 when a small group representing Friends, ELC Museums and Aberdeenshire Libraries met to discuss the feasibility of a jointly produced exhibition featuring John Muir and his close friend, artist William Keith. That idea was shelved when the two local authorities decided that they had other priorities for their limited resources.

Gone but not forgotten! It seemed to Friends that 2018 would be an ideal year for presenting the remarkable story of the long friendship between the two emigrant Scots who had both been born in 1838. And 2018 is to be Scotland's Year of Young People. Muir left Dunbar with his family in 1849, not quite 11 years old, and Keith emigrated from Oldmeldrum with his mother and sisters when he was twelve. Young people, mere boys, from Scotland who went on to help shape modern California and to have a lasting influence on their adopted homeland, the United States. John Muir already is an inspiration to many young folk in Scotland and elsewhere. Surely their separate and joint stories would inspire many more.

So Friends are leading the way with our next exhibition, provisionally entitled '*Kindred Souls*' and currently being researched. The target date for it opening in the Birthplace is 1 April 2018 in good time for Muir's birthday on 21 April. It is hoped that it will later make its way to Oldmeldrum for 21 November for Keith was born there on 21 November 1838 (although some would argue that it was a year later).

The meeting with David and Lorraine was very helpful. They were enthusiastic about Friends' plans and feel better able to persuade 'the powers that be' in Aberdeenshire to support the venture, even talking about the possibility of interesting Aberdeen to come on board. Also, one of Lorraine's areas of interest is family history and she was able to confirm most of our research findings regarding Keith's earliest years (although the question of 1838 or 1839 has still to be solved).

How the Keith-Muir friendship started and grew

Artist William Keith first visited Yosemite, briefly, in 1864, the year he married Elizabeth Emerson. That was six years before John Muir. In 1872 the Emersons were in New England. Elizabeth was a distant relative of Ralph Waldo Emerson, writer and transcendentalist, and it is thought that the Keiths paid the 'Sage of Concord' a visit. He had just returned from California where Muir's mentor Mrs Jeanne Carr had persuaded him to visit Yosemite and gave him a letter of introduction to Muir. Emerson was hugely impressed by the Scot, adding him to his list 'My Men' which included Coleridge, Wordsworth, Thoreau and Carlyle. Muir was the 18th and last.

The Keiths returned to California. Willie sought out Mrs Carr and was given a letter of introduction. In October 1872, accompanied by fellow artist Benoni Irwin, Keith was literally knocking on Muir's door in Yosemite Valley. The two Scots became immediate friends. Keith returned to Yosemite, and Muir, in 1873, this time with second wife Mary and his two children. Perhaps as a result he spent time in a San Francisco hospital suffering from "over exertion and exposure" but in 1875 he was back in Yosemite joining up with Muir and two mutual friends.

The two Scots were not involved in any major outings together for ten years or so but maintained contact with the Keiths living in Oakland and Muir, now married to Louisa Strentzel, based in Martinez. When Muir accepted the commission to edit 'Picturesque California' in 1886, he invited Keith to be one of its illustrators. The artist accompanied Muir on some of his trips, the longest being in 1888.

By then the Keiths were frequent visitors to Martinez and Muir a regular caller at Keith's studio in San Francisco. The friendship was well and truly forged.

The John Muir Association, based in Martinez, Costa Contra County CA, was set up in 1956 to preserve the John Muir Home and gravesite in Martinez. In 1964 these properties became the John Muir National Historic Site under the control of the US National Parks Service. Today the JMA continues to support the work of the NPS at the JMNHS, working closely with the small team of NPS Rangers based there.

Friends relations with the JMA have been much closer since links were established with JMA board member Sherida Bush. Sherida has been a member of the board for 11 years and during the last how many editor of its magazine 'The View' (originally 'The View from John Muir's Window'). As JMA project manager, she has also been heavily involved in the organisation of the annual John Muir Birthday-Earth Day celebrations. This is held on the nearest Saturday to 21 April and has been increasing in popularity year on year drawing in over 2,000 participants.

However in August Sherida told us that she had sent in her resignation and her last board meeting would be 14 September. Will Collin sent her best wishes on behalf of Friends and hoped that their one-to-one correspondence would continue. He also asked that JMA nominate a replacement contact and JMA co-presidents Bruce Campbell and Mark Thomson volunteered. Mark was a member of the group of JMA board members who visited Dunbar in May 2015.

I spent an hour in this small but immensely informative museum. Do not come here expecting to see his bed, curtains, kitchen, etc. Rather, this is a humble tribute to a great man. There are several educational and entertaining interactive displays including three short movies. The staff (man and woman - I wish I remembered their names) was extremely friendly, enthusiastic and full of information about Mr. Muir as well as the town of Dunbar. I suggest heading down to the waterfront and follow (part of) the John Muir Trail for a lovely seaside walk in honor of this great, forward-thinking naturalist who was ahead of his time.

The short informative videos, sound bites and visual exhibits flow nicely from his early life in Dunbar to his environmental work in the American West.
